PREPARING FOR WORSHIP

Please silence all mobile devices during the liturgy so that we can enter into a time of reverent prayer. The complete Order of Mass, including readings from Holy Scripture, is found in this leaflet. The portions spoken or sung by the congregation are found in bold print. Please feel free to take this leaflet home with you.

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

You and your children, no matter how young, are most welcome here! We encourage all children to remain in church for Mass. They are an important part of our liturgical life together. There is a "soft space" for children and families in the back southwest corner of the church. Our restroom in the cloister is also equipped with a baby changing table. To access the restroom, exit the church at the front left by the pulpit, and then turn right into the cloister hallway. The restroom is straight ahead. If you need a place to take your child during Mass that is more private, please feel free to move to our Lady Chapel at the front of the church. Simply take the side aisle from the "soft space" straight to the chapel. Children's formation takes place from 9:30 to 10:15 a.m. each Sunday, September through May. If you are interested in learning more about this ministry, please speak with Father Kyle.

ABOUT LITURGY AT GOOD SHEPHERD

Worship at the Church of the Good Shepherd is rooted in the Catholic tradition of the Episcopal Church, a part of the wider Anglican Communion. We believe that our bodies are important in our lives of faith. We sit, stand, kneel, make the sign of the cross, and use other ways of praying with our bodies. Participate as you are comfortable. In the Episcopal Church, all baptized persons, regardless of denomination and including children, are invited to receive the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood. Persons who do not wish to receive the Sacrament are invited to come forward with everyone else to receive a blessing. The setting of the Ordinary of the Mass (those portions sung by the Choir) is the *Festival Communion Service* by Alec Wyton (1921–2007). 






THE FIRST LESSON

Acts 2:1-21

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. And suddenly a sound came from heaven like the rush of a mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared to them tongues as of fire, distributed and resting on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance. Now there were dwelling in Jerusalem Jews, devout men from every nation under heaven. And at this sound the multitude came together, and they were bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in his own language. And they were amazed and wondered, saying, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us in his own native language? Parthians and Medes and Elamites and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabians, we hear them telling in our own tongues the mighty works of God." And all were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others mocking said, "They are filled with new wine." But Peter, standing with the eleven, lifted up his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who dwell in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and give ear to my words. For these men are not drunk, as you suppose, since it is only the third hour of the day; but this is what was spoken by the prophet Joel: 'And in the last days it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams; yea, and on my menservants and my maidservants in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show wonders in the heaven above and signs on the earth beneath, blood, and fire, and vapor of smoke; the sun shall be turned into darkness and the moon into blood, before the day of the Lord comes, the great and manifest day. And it shall be that whoever calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

THE SECOND LESSON

Romans 8:22-27

We know that the whole creation has been groaning in travail together until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait for adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies. For in this hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what he sees? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience. Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words. And he who searches the hearts of men knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.

But now I am going to him who sent me; yet none of you asks me, 'Where are you going?' But because I have said these things to you, sorrow has filled your hearts. Nevertheless I tell you the truth: it is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Counselor will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you. And when he comes, he will convince the world concerning sin and righteousness and judgment: concerning sin, because they do not believe in me; concerning righteousness, because I go to the Father, and you will see me no more; concerning judgment, because the ruler of this world is judged. I have yet many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now. When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own authority, but whatever he hears he will speak, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, for he will take what is mine and

THE HOLY BAPTISM

THE PRESENTATION AND EXAMINATION OF THE CANDIDATES

Celebrant Parents & Godparents	The Candidate for Holy Baptism will now be presented. I present Douglas Joseph Backman, III to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.
Celebrant Parents & Godparents	Will you be responsible for seeing that the child you present is brought up in the Christian faith and life? I will, with God's help.
Celebrant	Will you by your prayers and witness help this child to grow into the full stature of Christ?
Parents & Godparents	I will, with God's help.
Celebrant	Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God?
Parents & Godparents	I renounce them.
Celebrant	Do you renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of God?
Parents & Godparents	I renounce them.

Celebrant Parents & Godparents	Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God? I renounce them.
Celebrant Parents & Godparents	Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your Savior? I do.
Celebrant Parents & Godparents	Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love? I do.
Celebrant Parents & Godparents	Do you promise to follow and obey him as your Lord? I do.

The Congregation then stands as the Celebrant addresses them.

Celebrant People	Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being? I will, with God's help.
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Celebrant	Let us now pray for this person who is to receive the Sacrament of new birth.


The Celebrant and People chant the following, as the procession moves to the font.

Celebrant	Deliver him, O Lord, from the way of sin and death.	
People	Lord, hear our prayer.	
Celebrant People	Open his heart to thy grace and truth. Lord, hear our prayer.	
Celebrant People	Fill him with thy holy and life-giving Spirit. Lord, hear our prayer.	
Celebrant People	Keep him in the faith and communion of thy holy Church. Lord, hear our prayer.	
Celebrant People	Teach him to love others in the power of the Spirit. Lord, hear our prayer.	
Celebrant People	Send him into the world in faithful witness to thy love. Lord, hear our prayer.	
Celebrant People	Bring him to the fullness of thy peace and glory. Lord, hear our prayer.	
Celebrant	Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ thy Son may live in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory; who liveth and reigneth now and for ever. Amen.	

THE THANKSGIVING OVER THE WATER

The Celebrant blesses the water, first singing



The Celebrant continues

We thank thee, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it thou didst lead the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it thy Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank thee, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to thy Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Now sanctify this water, we pray thee, by the power of thy Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue forever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior. To him, to thee, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and forever. **Amen.**

THE BAPTISMS

The Candidate is then presented by name to the Celebrant, who pours water upon him, saying

Douglas, I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

A candle is lighted from the Paschal Candle and presented to the Candidate.

Celebrant Douglas, receive the light of Christ. Amen.

The Celebrant then places a hand on the head of the newly baptized person, marking his forehead with the sign of the cross, using the oil of Chrism, and saying

Douglas, you are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever. Amen.

At the entrance to the baptistery and in full sight of the People, the Celebrant prays the following.

Let us pray.

Heavenly Father, we thank thee that by water and the Holy Spirit thou hast bestowed upon this thy servant the forgiveness of sin, and hast raised him to the new life of grace.

Sustain him, O Lord, in thy Holy Spirit. Give him an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love thee, and the gift of joy and wonder in all thy works. **Amen.**

Let us welcome the newly baptized.


We receive you into the household of God. Confess the faith of Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection, and share with us in his eternal priesthood.





People We praise thee, we bless thee, we give thanks to thee, and we pray to thee, O Lord our God.



All may come forward at this time. All baptized Christians, regardless of denomination, are invited to receive Holy Communion. If you are not receiving the Sacrament, you may indicate this by crossing your arms over your chest, and the Priest will offer a blessing. At the direction of the ushers, please exit your pew and move to the Communion rail and kneel. To receive Communion, kindly extend your hands and raise them slightly so that the Celebrant can place the consecrated Bread in your palm. To consume the Wine, please use a hand to gently guide the chalice to your lips. Should you wish to receive only the Bread, simply cross your hands over your chest as the Minister with the Wine approaches. If you are unable to come forward to receive Communion, please indicate this to one of the ushers so that the Priest can bring the Sacrament to you.


Kneeling, all say together the following, at the Celebrant's bidding.

Final Main Line Early Music Concert of Season

The final concert of our 2023-2024 season will be performed by the Franklin Quartet on Sunday, June 9 at 3 p.m. (This concert was rescheduled from February.) For centuries, Western Europe has viewed the Ottoman Turks and Romani as exotic. Relative to the rest of Europe they were geographically nearby but remote in custom. It was perceived that their music evoked sensualism and voluptuousness as well as something dangerous and menacing. 18th-century composers were tickled to bring these foreign musical elements into their works. No matter how fleeting those musical moments may have been in the context of broader compositions, they elicited images of the "exotic" or "otherness." How should we respectfully observe this in today's modern society? As alluring as those snippets are, they don't exist without controversy. Join the Franklin Quartet as they explore the Ottoman Empire and Romani influence in string quartets by Haydn and Dittersdorf, interspersed with traditional Hungarian and Armenian folk tunes.
